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
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
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How to choose a swimming pool that is right for you

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How to refresh your kitchen one cabinet at a time

(NC) Painting your cabinets is an affordable way to breathe life back into your space, and ideal for refreshing the look and feel of your kitchen, or add the finishing touches after a major renovation. That said, painting cabinets might also seem like a daunting, time-consuming task.

Here, Sharon Grech, Benjamin Moore Colour & Design Expert shares her best practices for selecting the right paint, preparation, and application to help streamline the process:

Preparation is key: For a perfect finish, take the time to ensure you are working on a clean, even surface. If possible, it's alwavs best to remove and lav cabinet doors flat for the best results. Making sure your cabinets are clean, dry, and free of wax and oil is the first step when preparing to paint. Then, take note of any peeling, scaling or glossy surfaces and sand them down. Before priming, ensure all traces of sanding dust have been removed. It's also important to determine if your surface has been previously painted or

not – if it's a new surface, it will need to be fully primed, otherwise, only prime spots where paint has chipped away.

plains. "Kitchens are high traffic areas, so cabinets need to withstand daily wear and tear." Alkydbased paints are a very common choice because of their resilience. but they often produce a strong odour and have a tendency to yellow when working with whites. For an optimal finish, Grech recommends Benjamin Moore Advance Waterborne Interior Alkvd paint (available in a pearl, semigloss or high-gloss finish). It uses proprietary technology with low VOCs that help keep odours to a minimum, while achieving a highend finish that won't fade.


Time to paint: "I prefer using a nylon polyester angle-sash brush to achieve the best results when painting cabinets," Grech points out. "However, if you prefer using a roller, use a very low pile to achieve the smoothest texture." She also suggests ensuring there is extra ventilation in the work area for faster drying times. Give yourself four to six hours for the first coat to dry and, if necessary, reapply a second coat after 16 hours. It's ideal to save this project for the weekend or a time when you have a few days to

Howto resources abound at your local library or book store. It is also wise to get a few quotes from professional outfits to better understand the scope of your project.

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Downsizing is easier with a guiding hand

(NC) No matter whether you're an empty nester, a person looking to simplify your life, or someone who wants to help their

aging parents move into a more functional space, downsizing can be a stressful experience. A little guidance goes a long way however.

Designer Wendy Wilkinson of Oakville, Ontario specializes in helping people transition into smaller living spaces, so here are a few of her tips to make it easier:

Before you begin to pack: Take multiple pictures (from various angles) of every room in your house. Each photo will give you

a record and act as a reference for what to get rid of and what to keep. Photos also provide good insurance information for any moving issues.

Decide ahead of time which items have sentimental value and will be making the transition with you. At the same time, if there are adult children, have them reclaim their belongings before the move. If going through sentimental items, such as photographs, is overwhelming, hire a professional organizer to help.

Place different coloured sticky notes on furnishings labelling them with an action plan like 'donate', 'new home', or 'sell'. Give yourself a few days to reconsider your decisions. Consult a designer to talk over what will work in your new space and what items should be kept to stage your home for sale. Wilkinson says that on one occasion she salvaged her client's children's furniture to create a play space that became a big selling feature.

Keep calm and carry on: Start de-cluttering in advance of your move, even if it is only one drawer or closet a day. Scale down

by discarding what you don't use or wear. If you are not sure about anything, just drop it in a 'decide later' box.

Give books to your local library sale and dispose of electronic equipment. Think green and donate still-useable items to places like the ReStores of home-building organization, Habitat for Humanity. ReStores accept a wide range of household products and provide a tax receipt for the value of your donation. You can find one in your community at www.habitat.ca/restore.

Colour code rooms and corresponding boxes of the contents you'll be keeping, then colour

code the doorway in the new space for an easy transition.

Draw up a floor plan and measure furniture pieces such as tables and sofas. They are often too large to go into a new downsized home.

Looking to the Future: Homeowners need to consider their furniture from an ergonomic standpoint. Is it too low or too big? Can you get in and out of it easily? It might be time to donate old furniture and invest in updated pieces that work with your new space.

Consider moving to a home that is within walking distance of stores, local library, and other favourite places. Depending on your age, think about a home with Accessibility Design Standards. This ensures that your new place will meet any possible needs in the future, such as wider doorways and additions to the bathrooms.

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WHERE DOES YOUR WATER FLOW ?

Whether one believes that global warming is creating warmer temperatures in our region or not, one thing is true for sure: when we do have weather events they are far more severe than in the recent past. Ice storms, hurricanes, and rain storms mimicking monsoons all have had an impact on us in one manner or another recently. When it comes to your property, one of the most damaging forces is water; be it in the form of a flood, or more commonly, lack of sufficient drainage away from your house foundation and off your property. Have a look around your property to identify areas where water is not draining sufficiently and is taking an extraordinary amount of time to dry up. There are measures that can be taken with the help of a professional landscape crew to reduce or eliminate the amount of stagnant water on your property. Methods of water drainage might include a dry creek bed which is attractive in the middle of summer when it is dry, but is very functional when a large flow of water appears with rainstorms. If the flow of water is not as heavy, but direction needs to be given to the water so it does not flow in unwanted areas of the yard, a swale can be constructed. The swale is a shallow, contoured ditch-like area that directs the water on a specific course, usually as part of the lawn. French drains can also be constructed for areas that require drainage of a reasonably heavy flow of water, but which are in the parameters of a lawn and need to be easily be maintained. Around the foundation of a house or other structure, a "drip edge" consisting of drainage stone can be helpful in allowing water to drain easily down into the subsurface layers of subsoil and gravel and down into the water table rather that sitting close to your foundation wall. Coincidentally, a drip edge can also be an attractive way to deal with areas that are particularly dry and do not promote good plant growth or grass growth next to a foundation.

Make a note in the coming months of what areas in your yard appear to hold water for longer than one day. Have a look at the grade of your property as it relates to your house. Does the land flow toward your house, or away? Don't assume there is nothing you can do to prevent water damaging your biggest investment. Talk to a certified, professional landscaper about what options you have to protect your home and keep your property looking beautiful and free of water damage.

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Explore the alternatives to granite countertops

Granite has long been a popular countertop material for homeowners looking to combine functionality with aesthetic appeal in their kitchens. But granite is no small investment, and homeowners looking to refurbish their kitchens should know there are a multitude of countertop materials available to those working on a budget or those who simply want to give their kitchens a different look.

• Solid wood: Wood countertops create a warm, homey interior. Butcher block counters are less expensive than granite and do not necessarily need to be ordered from a speciality retailer. But wood can stain and dent and can even burn when hot kitchenware is placed atop it. Regular application of oil can help homeowners maintain the appearance of their wood counters for years to come.

• **Marble:** Marble tends to be less expensive than granite without sacrificing aesthetic appeal. However, marble is softer and more porous than granite, so it can stain and be etched. Diligence in wiping away spills, routine sealing and a gentle touch is necessary for those who choose marble countertops.

• **Soapstone:** This is a natural stone composed mainly of mineral talc that gives the stone its smooth feel. Soapstone ranges from black to gray but can sometimes have a green shade to it. Other materials in the stone can produce veining. Although softer than granite, soapstone is still high-density and will hold up well. It's impervious to stains and bacteria, and exposure to chemicals will not damage it.



• Quartz: Quartz is a manufactured product made of stone aggregate and polymers compressed under high pressure. It has the look of natural stone but requires less work to maintain. Quartz has consistent colors and patterns and is a nonporous material, so it will not need routine sealing and resealing.

• Glass: Glass countertops are back-painted, so homeowners can order just about any color they want. Glass will be tempered, so it is safe and heat-resistant. Glass can scratch, though, so it is not as impervious as other materials.

• **Concrete:** Concrete is another material that can be colored to match homeowners' whims. Concrete is relatively inexpensive compared to other countertop materials, but it can crack or chip.

While granite is a popular countertop material, homeowners who want something new have many additional options at their disposal. SH152891

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Keep the spring thaw outside where it belongs

(NC) After winter's long deep freeze, most of us look forward to warmer spring weather and longer hours of sunshine. But not all aspects of spring are as pleasant. Melting snow can spell trouble, leading to leaky roofs and ice build-up.

"The spring thaw can be destructive to personal property," says Ryan Michel, senior vice president and chief risk officer at Allstate Canada. "We recommend that homeowners take extra care this season to prevent damaging ice formations and leaks. Melting snow can create ice dams that can tear off gutters, lift shingles, and lead leaks directly into your home."

Ice dams can form on your eavestroughs or on the lower edge of a home's roof, Michel points out. When the temperature in your attic is above freezing, it melts the snow on your shingles. The water trickles down to a cooler part of the roof where it freezes, usually on the eavestroughs and the roof overhang. Eventually, a build-up of ice forms – an ice dam – and begins to leak beneath the shingles and then into your home. One of the biggest warning signs of ice damming is the formation of large icicles that hang from the roof.

If left unchecked, leaks caused by ice dams can harm your roof and shingles, damage insulation and interior walls and can even compromise your home's structural integrity.

Here are a few tips to prevent ice dams from forming and damaging your home:

1. Clear leaves and other debris from eavestroughs and downspouts.



- 2. Properly insulate areas in your attic that lose heat. This includes wrapping and insulating heating ducts.
- 3. Make sure your attic is properly ventilated under the roof deck.
- 4. If safe, clear new snowfall from gutters using a snow rake or broom. Never attempt to go onto the roof as slippery conditions can be dangerous. Always hire a professional to inspect and repair your roof. Bamboo grows plentifully and matures fully in just four years, making it one of the most sustainable materials for your home. "Bamboo is particularly perfect for bathrooms because it can stand up in a moist climate without deteriorating or peeling," Morse advises. Low VOC's are also used in the laminate that holds the plywood together.

3. Energy-Efficient Window Treatments

Energy lost through windows can account for up to 25 percent of utility bills. "Highly insulating Duette Architella honeycomb shades from Hunter Douglas have a cell-within-a-cell honeycomb structure that can reduce solar heat gain in summer by up to 80 percent and can reduce heat loss in winter by up to 45 percent," she notes. 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5 popular sustainable flooring options

With natural, renewable elements used in its manufacturing, the popularity of this eco-friendly flooring option continues to rise.

• Cork flooring has many eco-friendly attributes. Like bamboo, cork is quickly renewable. It is harvested from the bark of the cork oak tree and grows back every three years. Cork has anti-microbial properties to reduce allergens, is fire retardant and provides a comfortable feel under foot. Cork flooring can be finished in a variety of paints and stains to complement any room setting.

• Polyester (P.E.T.) Berber carpet is a sustainable option made of recycled plastic bottles. Anytime we can reuse these materials, we reduce the amount of new materials being manufactured and we reduce non-biodegradable materials in our landfills. Polyester Berber is spill resistant and comes in a variety of aesthetically – pleasing colours and patterns.



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Think through the right way to do renovations

(NC) For some Canadians, the cold weather means bundling up and hunkering down. As you spend more time indoors, the state of your home may become increasingly apparent, prompting you to consider a renovation. Some projects must wait until spring returns, but others don't require the warm weather.

Common mistakes made on home renovation projects

the accelerator as soon as possible and coast instead of staying on the gas until the last second and slamming on the brakes. Your car uses little or no fuel when coasting.

5. Eco-Driving can result in as much as a 25 per cent reduction in fuel costs or roughly \$500 a year and \$2,500 over five years for the average vehicle. Not only does eco-driving save fuel, but it also reduces maintenance costs.

Warning signs a tire is about to go flat

Few drivers will be fortunate enough to go their entire driving lives without encountering at least one flat tire. Flat tires range from the inconvenient flats, which may interrupt a road trip or make drivers late for work or an appointment, to more dangerous blowouts, which can compromise the safety of drivers, their passengers and anyone else on the road when the tire gives out.

But as inconvenient or dangerous as flats or blowouts can be, they also can be prevented more often than not. Tires often produce warning signs that a flat or blowout is about to emerge, so drivers who want to avoid such unfortunate developments can inspect their tires for the following signs.

• Varying wear: Tires should exhibit the same type of wear. The wear on front tires and back tires may differ, but one front tire should have the same amount of wear as the other and the same goes for the back tires. Uneven tread on tires indicates that the tire with more wear could be about to go out.

• Worn tread: Even drivers who know little about cars can typically recognize when tire tread has worn down to the point where the tire is a safety risk. But drivers who are unsure can employ the quarter test. Insert a quarter into the tread of the tire, with George Washington's head upright. If you can see the hairline of the United States' first president, then you need to replace the tire. Perform this test on each of your vehicle's four tires.

• **Low pressure:** Drivers who do not routinely check their tire pressure are more likely to endure a flat or blowout than those who regularly make sure their tires are at the manufacturer-recommended pressure, which can be found in a vehicle owner's manual or by calling the tire manufacturer or visiting their website. An underinflated tire is under stress that can cause the tire to blowout. In addition, poorly inflated tires force engines to work harder, which negatively affects a car's fuel efficiency.

• **Vibration:** A car that vibrates excessively may do so because tires are damaged. Poor suspension is another cause of excessive vibration. Whatever is behind a car that is vibrating, drivers should immediately take the car to their mechanic for an inspection.

• **Physical damage to the tire:** Sometimes tires exhibit physical damage like bulges or cuts, and such signs could mean a flat tire or blowout is just around the corner. Tires that exhibit such physical damage need to be replaced immediately.

Flat tires and blowouts can prove both scary and inconvenient. Drivers who want to avoid such problems should routinely inspect their tires for indicators that a flat or blowout is likely to occur. SC153005

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

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The potentially harmful effects of mold in your home

The presence of mold in a home is a sight few homeowners want to see. In addition to being unsightly, mold found in a home can be unhealthy. While certain cleaners may prove effective at removing mold, homeowners who want to remove existing mold growths and prevent future growths may benefit from gaining a greater understanding of mold and why it grows inside homes.

What is mold?

Mold is a blanket term used to describe fungi that can be found both indoors and outdoors. Many species of mold exist, and the Centers for Disease Control and Prevention notes that some estimates suggest there may be more than three hundred thousand different species of mold. Common indoor molds include cladosporium, penicillium, alternaria, and aspergillus.

Which conditions promote mold growth?

Homeowners may notice that mold tends to grow in specific areas of their homes but not in others, and that's because molds grow best in certain conditions. Warm, damp and humid conditions, such as those found in poorly ventilated bathrooms and basements, make ideal breeding grounds for mold.

What are the effects of mold exposure?

Molds are a natural and resilient part of the environment, but mold growth indoors should be addressed and avoided. Mold spores are tiny and invisible to the naked eye, and when these spores attach to wet surfaces, they begin to grow. Once these spores begin to grow, they can then affect people in various ways. Roughly a decade ago, the Institute of Medicine found sufficient evidence to support a link between exposure to indoor mold and respiratory tract issues, such as coughing and wheezing in peo-

ple who were otherwise healthy. The same report found that mold may trigger asthma symptoms among people with asthma and hypersensitivity pneumonitis, a disease in which the lungs are inflamed when a person breathes in certain dusts he or she is allergic to, in people susceptible to that condition.

Some people who do not have a preexisting condition can still be sensitive to molds. When exposed to mold, such people may experience symptoms like nasal stuffiness, eye irritation, wheezing, or skin irritation.

How can exposure to mold be decreased at home?

Adequate ventilation is arguably homeowners' best friend with regard to reducing mold exposure at home. Control humidity levels in areas of the home that tend to be warm and humid, such as the kitchen and bathroom. Install an exhaust fan in the kitchen and bathroom and a window in the bathroom if yours does not already have one.

The CDC recommends that humidity levels be no higher than 50 percent throughout the day, and an air conditioner and dehumidifier can help you keep indoor humidity levels in check, especially during the summer when humidity levels tend to be their highest of any time during the year.

When renovating your home, remove any existing carpeting from bathrooms and basements and toss out soaked carpets or upholstery as well. If painting will be part of your home renovation projects, add mold inhibitors to paints prior to application.

Mold that grows inside a home is unsightly and potentially unhealthy. But concerned homeowners can take several reactive and proactive steps to reduce existing mold growths and prevent them from returning in the future. SH152903



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
