




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

Take Spring Cleaning Outdoors

(NC)—Now that the wintry weather is gone it's time to think about spring cleaning. And while many of us focus on indoor activities like cleaning out closets and drawers, don't forget to roll up those sleeves and tend to your lawn and garden. To aerate, remove plugs of sod to loosen the soil. Depending on the size of your lawn, you may want to consider using a manual aerating tool. Smaller lawns can be easily aerated with a spike aerator that removes plugs from the turf.

Woeful weed – Start weeding early to prevent seeding and spreading. 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Let Colour Express Welcome In An Entry Or Foyer

In the tiniest of entries, Grech suggested one colour is best for both walls and ceilings.

While most people end up using the same colour in the entry that adds continuity with the other interior colours, Grech advised to think about what's on the other side of the door. "If you live by water, go with a blue or other calming watery hue reflective of what's in view. Or, if you're surrounded by woods, think about an earthy tone."

So for a longer lasting beautiful bamboo floor choose a 100% natural bamboo flooring product.

Make sure that your supplier provides you with top installation service

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or recommends a highly qualified and experienced installer who is specialized in the installation of bamboo flooring and stairs.

Preparation of the surface prior to installation is also very important. For the best results the floor needs to be completely cleared from carpet, tiles, vinyl or linoleum, etc. Any underlay should be removed, as well as any glue, bond crete or paint residue, because this affects adhesion. In other words; the floor should be stripped down to the raw concrete. Your supplier should be able to recommend someone dependable to do this job for you.

• Keep clear all exhaust flues or ducts used by water heaters, ranges and clothes dryers (snow, ice, leaves, garbage etc).




Photo Caption: A CO alarm and an annual heating system inspection is essential to protecting your family from carbon monoxide gas.


Fire Prevention:

- Install one cUL-approved smoke alarm on every level of your home and outside or in sleeping areas (if you sleep with your door closed).
- Test all smoke alarms monthly and replace them every 10 years, whether battery operated or hard—wired.
- Change batteries at least once per year.
- Prepare a fire escape plan with your family and practice it, ensuring you

identify two exits from every room if possible. Consider buying a two-storey safety ladder to ensure there is a second escape route via a window.

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Look Before You Leap Into Buying A New Home

The information is factual, unbiased and contains practical advice for making what could be the biggest purchase of your life.

Really think about what is important to you in your new home – a two–car garage, main floor laundry, no rear neighbours or a view of the city. Once you've established your priority list, establish your price range based on your financial situation. Compare mortgage rates, terms and conditions at a number of financial institutions. Mortgage rates and conditions vary widely so shop around.

Unless you're in a building trade, you won't necessarily see the faults in a home you're considering, so you may want to hire a home inspector. Keep in mind that home inspectors are not subject to industry regulation in most provinces. You will want to do some homework to find a reliable inspector. Ask friends and neighbours for references, and ask those inspectors you're thinking of hiring about their training, experience and membership in professional organizations. Your inspector should always provide you with a written report.

If condo living is what you're after, research the building thoroughly – who built it, how old it is, maintenance fees, by–laws, rules and restrictions for such things as gardens, outside decorating or pets.

These are just some of the topics covered in the 'housing' section of the Canadian Consumer Handbook. The sections on landlord and tenant problems, mortgages and moving are worth reading so that buying the house of your dreams doesn't turn into a nightmare.

Six Easy Decorating Tips By Jackie Morra

(NC)—Getting started on a new renovation or decorating project is not as difficult as it seems if you follow the process I used for my own bedroom renovation.

How do I decide on flooring? The floor area sets the tone and feel, and is the second largest space next to the walls. Research the right product for your lifestyle. The key to longevity is to take into consideration quality, the look you want and installation. The flooring used in my bedroom renovation, for instance, is Torlys cork plank, vintage block chai. It was actually the inspiration for this space because I fell in love with the comfort, warmth and the many environmental benefits of the floor. How do I coordinate fabrics? Fabrics need to complement each other and not compete in terms of colour, pattern and scale in order to balance furnishings and style without being visually distracting. Try to choose all fabrics within a space at the same time.

How do I choose and display accessories? If you don't love it, live without it. Accessories should be a reflection of your personality or style. Group accessories in odd numbers, preferably in threes, while varying the height of objects. Pillows, artwork, lighting and treasured pieces add a finishing touch and can be easily updated. What is the right placement and size for artwork? Hang artwork 60 inches from the floor to the centre of the art. For hallways and stairs use 65 inches. Artwork over a bed or piece of furniture should be 2/3 of the overall width and not higher than 8



inches from the furniture.

Where do I hang drapery hardware? Drapery hardware should be mounted at least 2 inches above the window frame. Drapery panels should extend 12 to 18 inches on either side of the window to maximize the light and viewing area.

How many light sources do I need in a room? Ideally there should be three lights in a room. This can include overhead, functional/task, and mood lighting. In a dining room, the fixture should hang 30 inches above the table and be at least ½ of the table's width.

Read Instructions Before Cleaning Your Window Shades

(NC)—With winter behind us, the sun may be telling you something about your window coverings. It may be telling you that they need cleaning. Before you grab your scrub brush and get to work, listen to this advice from Mary Dobson, spokesperson for Levolor Window Fashions in Canada.

"Caution is essential when you need to clean blinds and shades," says Mary. "You may be doing more harm than good, because what works with one kind of blind may ruin another, and void the warranty, too. My basic advice is – if you are in any doubt about how to do the job, don't!"

Perhaps the best thing you can do for window shades, of any kind, is to dust them regularly. Use a feather duster or a small soft vacuum cleaner brush; just stroke lightly over the shade. Plastic and metal surfaces can benefit from additional wiping with a soft sudsy cloth, being careful not to use abrasive cleaners. If you choose blinds from the Accordia designer colours collections, you won't have to dust so often. They feature dust-guard, a permanent fabric finish that prevents dust from settling.

Wood and other natural materials should be treated with great care. Don't use water, solvents or abrasive solutions of any kind. Vacuum only, or use a soft, dry cloth to remove dust.


Plastic roller shades can be cleaned effectively with a soft sponge and soapsuds. The best approach for fabric roller shades, and romans, is a light vacuuming at low power to remove dirt. A gentle spot cleaner may come in handy when caring for fabric blinds.




Photo Caption: Regular dusting is the only cleaning required for most window shades. Special care should be taken with wood and other natural materials.

Mary offers a useful tip for cellular Accordia shades. "Sometimes a little bug will make a home inside one of the cells. Leave it there, and it may eventually stain the fabric. Before that happens just blow it away – using a hair dryer on a cool setting."

The quality of a wood door varies from wood composite to solid wood construction. They are available in a very wide price range. The more you pay, the better the quality.
- Other materials such as vinyl or fibreglass. Vinyl garage doors are completely maintenance free. They are scratch resistant. While the initial cost of a vinyl door is greater than doors made of other materials, the long-term cost is lower.

No. 2: What company should I buy from?

Unfortunately, the garage door industry in Canada is not strictly monitored, J-F Morin says. There are many fly-by-night companies that are not insured and do not provide their employee's with workers' compensation. You want to look for a company that:

- is professional and courteous;
- supplies references from previous customers upon request;
- provides their technicians with uniforms and clean trucks;
- carries adequate insurance.

No. 3: Where do I purchase a garage door?

There are three types of retailers to choose from when purchasing a garage door: mega home-supply stores, door & window dealers, and garage door specialists. 

1st to make the main kitchen larger let's take care of the fridge, it was quickly swung to the far left of the room, just by reworking the closet we were able to get both the fridge and still have a small closet. Now we have a much more spacious stove layout. One down..two to go!

The 2nd item is the peninsula uppers and lowers. Simply remove both, and add an island, now so much more room for the cook to work on. The dining table area now feels so much more open

The 3rd major concern in this and other typical small kitchens is the microwave, rule 101 for micro's, never have them sitting on the counter, not only does it not look professional on the counter, it also uses up very valuable counter space. In the after photo you can see that it is in the same general location, but above a toaster garage. In that unit is the toaster


and coffee maker, which is still on the working counter, but just tidied up behind the roll up.







The Times Are Changing The Way We Decorate Our Homes

(NC)—Here we are, a few months into 2011, and already we can see a difference in the way Canadians look at their homes. A big change in attitudes is driving design choices. The shift is away from the disposable economy – "buy it, use it, get tired of it, buy something else" – to a sustainable economy. We think harder before making a purchase, watch the budget, and give ourselves bonus points for imagination and ingenuity.

Welcome to the era of Chiconomics. Meet the Frugal Fashionista and the Thoughtful Fixer-upper.

That's the general trend, and within it are different ways of expressing a personal feeling. I'll introduce you to four of them, and suggest ways that you could bring them into your own home.

First is Reclaimed Refinement – an invitation to explore the past, select items that please you, and integrate them into your lifestyle. When I say "the past" I don't necessarily mean antique stores – after all you are closely watching the budget. Think of yard sales, what's up in the attic, take a fresh look at that love seat your mom wants to get rid of. You are creating refined simplicity by re–interpreting traditional forms. Setting off the classic lines of old furniture are raw materials and textures: linen and burlap, large–pattern botanical prints in drapes and cushions, distressed woodwork and metal fittings – rods, and finials. But — there's a mini–trend here. Those deeply pitted and polished brasses are giving way to more muted finishes in gold, champagne and even plain black and white.

As for windows, I have two suggestions. First choice would be a wood (or faux wood) blind with 2-inch slats in a cream silk embossed finish. Or how about my favourite, the new Levolor Accordia shade, translucent, in warm gray tumbleweed. It'll save energy, too.

Comfortable Contemporary takes the hard-edged "contemporary" look and softens the outline, introduces curves, and marks the return of comfort to the modern home. It's a warm and livable play on the contemporary. Modular furniture is part of the look. So is a mix of materials, both natural and man-made. Natural light is an important element in this style.

One of my suggestions for windows and in this case a room divider, is PanelTrac, a thoroughly modern approach to window treatments – and door treatments, too. The look is clean, new, and slightly techno. Or, focusing on the "comfortable" aspect of this style, how about a Roman shade with cordless operation to keep things tidy. Your choice of fabric can bring welcome warmth and texture to the room.

Perhaps the lowest–cost style for 2011 is Collector Chic, because its main ingredients are things you already have. A collector chic interior tells a story – the story of the people who live there. It's a perfectly imperfect ensemble of treasures, combining furnishings, accessories, artwork and everything else that says something about yourselves, your lives and your aspirations. If your drapes or your carpets are rich in texture and bold in colour and pattern, so much the better. Anything goes – masculine and feminine forms, old and new, pricey and worthless – as long as the emotional connection is there.

On the windows I suggest a punch of colour and glamour with Perceptions shades, in which vertical slats are covered by a sheer layer. Visualize a really bold colour for the sheer layer – chili spice, perhaps. Or, back to my favourite, Accordia shades, with the top–down feature that can let daylight in from the top while covering the lower half of the window, natural light plus privacy.

Lastly we have Mid-Century Modern, a bold revival of mid-20th century design and idealism. It's the opposite of our present uncertainties. It's a throwback to a time that put man on the moon, and wood, leather, heavily textured fabrics and metal in the living room. Materials are natural, forms are masculine with figure-fitting curves.

And for the windows – rose–tinted glasses perhaps? Seriously, wood blinds in a rich tone and wide slats would be perfect. Or shades woven from natural materials, with a colour–co–ordinated liner to ensure privacy and achieve light control.

Built into most spa and hot tub models, LED lights require half the power of traditional halogen or incandescent lights and do a lot more than simply illuminate the spa underwater. These high–tech systems can be synchronized to put on a range of colourful light shows underwater — either a single colour or gradual colour transition for relaxation or a rapid display of

Picking Out The Perfect Pool

(NC)—A swimming pool is the perfect way to entertain the kids and spend quality time with your family or just to relax and enjoy the outdoors. But before you head out the door to your local pool store, take the time to learn about the different types of pools available. Here is an overview of what you can choose for your backyard.

Vinyl-lined pools are the most popular type of pool in Canada. Constructed of steel walled panels supported by steel braces, this type of pool features a vinyl liner placed over the steel panels and the pool floor and is held in place by coping around the pool perimeter.


Poured—in—place concrete pools use concrete that is poured over a rebar grid (steel rods for reinforcement) between prepared forms, while wet mix shotcrete uses pre—mixed concrete that is sprayed onto a steel reinforced grid through a hose nozzle. The walls of the pool are then finished in plaster or other coating products and then painted and decorated with tile or stone accents. Concrete pools are more labour—intensive than vinyl—lined pools and can take several weeks to build — but they do offer unlimited design potential.

Another option is a fibreglass pool. This type of pool is prefabricated and is shipped to the site on a trailer and lowered into the ground by a crane. The fibreglass shell is then plumbed and backfilled, with installations taking about one week.

The most affordable of all pool types is the above–ground pool, which consists of a vinyl liner attached to an above–ground metal or resin frame in a round or oval shape. Above–ground pools average 1.2 m to 1.3 m in height and offer contemporary colours and accents on the outside walls and uprights that allow them to complement any home or land-scaping design.

Onground pools – also called semi–inground pools are made of rigid steel or aluminum walls that are partially lowered into the ground. Ideal for backyards with uneven terrain, onground pools are also perfect for yards with limited space and are available in round and oval shapes.

Spring Safety Checklist

(NC)—As we welcome the spring temperatures, we should always keep safety top of mind. As the season changes from winter to spring, everyone is eager to get out and enjoy the warmer weather, outdoor spaces and tackle the "to-do" lists that have been growing over the winter months.

Here's a list of spring safety reminders from Enbridge Gas Distribution:

Safety in the Yard

When planning projects that require digging, such as planting a tree or building a fence, remember that natural gas and other utility lines could be buried in your yard. It's the law to locate buried natural gas lines before you dig. Contact Ontario One Call at 1–800–400–2255 or www.on1call.com at least one week before you start. After you call, they'll come out to your property to locate underground lines, mark them and leave a locate sheet providing instructions on how to safely proceed.

Make sure you landscape carefully near gas meters and regulators. Never raise the level of a garden so that soil touches your meter or regulator. Doing so could result in corrosion and cause a gas leak.

Safety by the Pool

Before pool season gets into full swing, it's the perfect time to have your pool heater serviced. Pool heaters, like other fuel-burning equipment, need to be maintained regularly to work safely and efficiently. Contact a licensed heating, ventilation and air conditioning (HVAC) contractor for service and questions.

Safety before you Barbecue

With grilling season around the corner, it's a great time to review your manufacturer's instructions for the maintenance and use of your barbecue. For many of us, the barbecue has been out of use for the winter, so it's also a good time to give it a thorough inspection.

Safety in a Flood

Spring showers and melting snow can increase the possibility of water main breaks and sewer backups. With your safety in mind, never enter any flooded areas. If you're experiencing a flood, don't attempt to restart your natural gas appliances until you've had them inspected. Natural gas appliances (including furnaces, boilers and water heaters) that have been submerged, partially submerged, come into contact with water, or had their gas controls or electrical cords come into contact with water are considered unsafe and must not be used until inspected by a licensed HVAC contractor.

Remember – always call your local gas utility if you smell natural gas or suspect damage to natural gas equipment due to flooding.

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Taking Inventory

All homeowners and tenants should have an up-to-date inventory of their possessions and a record of the items' values. This record is very useful to all parties involved (e.g., the homeowner or tenant, the insurer and the police) in the event of a burglary or fire. Without such a record on hand, it can be difficult for people to recall the details about items that are damaged or have gone missing.

When taking inventory, some people like to make a drawer-by-drawer, room-by-room record of their possessions using a photo or video camera. An audio recorder could be useful for making a spoken, detailed list of collections (e.g., books, tools, stamps, etc.). Written or typed descriptions are useful, too. However one decides to make an inventory, it should include items' makes, models, serial numbers and other identifying marks, as well as sales receipts for major items. Inventory records should be stored in a safety-deposit box or another secure location away from home.

One is a simple spreadsheet people can use to list their belongings room by room, and the other is an easy-to use software program called "Know Your Stuff," which gives users the options to upload photos and store their inventory data in a secure location.

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


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
